Local Doctor Graduated from Leading Integrative Medicine Fellowship

Duncan, MD, FACOG a local clinician at Long Island Jewish Medical Center/Katz Women’s Hospital has graduated from The Fellowship in Integrative Medicine at the Arizona Center for Integrative Medicine, at the University of Arizona College of Medicine.

Dr. Duncan, a board-certified Obstetrician/Gynecologist at Women for Women Ob/Gyn in Lake Success has spent 13 years serving the local community.

Dr. Duncan joins an elite group of practitioners to have initiated studies with this internationally-recognized integrative medicine program. Launched in 1997 by integrative medicine pioneer Andrew Weil, MD, the Fellowship in Integrative Medicine is a 1,000-hour, two-year distance-learning program for physicians, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

“We’re excited to have Dr. Duncan as part of this competitive and intensive program of study,” said Tieraona Low Dog, MD, director of the fellowship at the Arizona Center for Integrative Medicine and clinical associate professor of medicine at the University of Arizona College of Medicine. “She has showed a deep commitment to medicine and patient care in her personal statement and application and I’m fully confident that this two-years of additional training will give Dr. Duncan the tools to excel in integrative medicine and become a leader in the field.”
